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
STUDENTS OF THE MONTH

A LUCRATIVE WIN IN VEGAS AND A WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS IN SIBERIA

A longtime VCS student with many accolades already to his name, James Li was kind enough to answer some questions regarding his experience in two different tournaments to inspire future generations of aspiring chess players.

WORLD OPEN 2016

Played in a large hotel ballroom, James notes that he heard about this tournament from a fellow VCS classmate and decided to attend the tournament with a group of friends to enjoy the tournament with. He notes that much preparation went into playing in this tournament, and that he "prepared by solving puzzles on [his] Chess Mentor Exercises". He also says that while he "reviewed openings by playing 100 correspondence games a month before", he wishes he had "prepared more on [his] black opening repertoire, because [he] was not really sure how to play against some openings".

Participating in this large event had a strong positive impact on his chess, who appreciated the positive outlook it gave him and only strives to continue to improve his results.

"Attending this event further encouraged me to continue playing chess because it showed me results of my training paying off, and I can definitely achieve more than this."

When asked to reflect on the more general impact participation in this tournament had on his life outlook, James referred to the perseverance that is required in both a chess game and in life, citing an example from his third game:

"I had to really fight for my win on round 3 that tournament, because I had made a mistake in the early game, but I was not ready to give up. I continued playing the game and waited until my opponent made his losing mistake. Although it is true that my opponent could have not made any mistakes, no one is able to predict what happens, so keep working hard and keep playing. If you work hard enough, good things will definitely happen."

WORLD YOUTH CHESS CHAMPIONSHIP (WYCC)

Following his participation in a tournament as prestigious as the World Open, James continued to make time for chess by working tirelessly to participate in the 2016 World Youth Chess Championships. As the premier youth tournament in the world, even just participating in this event is a huge accomplishment and a coveted

goal for any youth chess player. Due to his financial success at the World Open, James was able to use part of those winnings to fund his trip to Russia for the WYCC, describing his World Open win as "a ticket to really see the world out there, and [he thinks] it was worth it".

When asked about his preparation for this tournament, James noted that he shifted his focus to his Black opening repertoire because he "learned from [his] past mistake at the World Open that playing Black needed improvement". He also cited mental preparation as more challenging for this tournament due to the fact it occurred during the school term. James also said that participating in this tournament opened his eyes to how chess is played on the world stage and this tournament showed him that "there are people out there who work even harder, and that [he] must work hard to become a better player".

Finally, James was pensive with regards to whether or not the experience was worth all his hard work and expenses. In spite of the lessons he learned such as the importance of "[looking] at how my opponents play" and going "more in depth to achieve an advantage in the opening", missing several weeks of school proved stressful and difficult to catch up. Summing up, he gives the final words of advice:

"I would recommend if you ever get the chance to play in a tournament like this when you are younger, do take the chance. You will see a variety of interesting things from play styles to pretty sights you can only see where the tournament is held."

CHESS IN SCHOOLS PROGRAM

The Chess in Schools (CIS) program is VCS's newest initiative to fulfill the core mandate of continuing chess education throughout the Lower Mainland. With 15 participating schools, CIS allows our chess school to have a much broader reach, and enables students throughout the region to have access to our comprehensive chess program. Open to everyone, CIS is able to teach groups of students with varying levels using our unique software and by assigning different class material and homework according to student's level of chess ability.

The CIS program consists of the same format as our usual VCS classes, with the coach presenting the class material and students playing against each other as well. Using custom software VCS is able to cater each lesson to the student's needs and the online homework provides extensive practice and exposure to key concepts for optimal improvement.

A special thank you goes out to VCS's dedicated CIS volunteers Stephanie Gu, Alex Yu and Bill Wang. These VCS students give their time to assist both the coach and students in these classes and their dedication and efforts are much appreciated. 


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VCS ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS CHAMPIONSHIP





On April 9th 2017 VCS will be hosting the first ever VCS Elementary Schools Championship tournament (https://vanchess.ca/tournaments/view/id/1204). Open to all students from participating CIS schools, this tournament is an opportunity for students to test their skills against players from other schools, gain tournament experience and be part of a team.

Each team will consist of four players, and each school may send multiple teams if they wish. Teams will be placed in either the more advanced Section A or the beginner Section B groups and competition in both sections consists of five rounds played at 25/5. The winning teams will be awarded with team trophies and medals will be awarded to all winning players.

A first of its kind, all students at VCS CIS schools are encouraged to come out, participate as a team, represent their schools, make new friends and compete for the title of Elementary School Champions. The top teams will be recommended to join the annual BC Elementary School Championships in May 2017 to compete with their schoolmates against schools from throughout the province and vie for the chance to become provincial champions.

TEAM BC TRAINING

VCS is proud to announce a rare chance to learn directly from a Grandmaster. GM Evgeny Bareev, formerly the fourth ranked player in the world, will be lecturing via Skype with BCCF President and BCCF President Stephen Wright leading ensuing analysis and practice sessions. This course is intended to help Team BC hone its already talented roster of provincial representatives to match the level of training received necessary to compete with the best provinces in Canada. In 2016, Team BC came in 3rd place at the Canadian Chess Challenge. We hope that with hard work and Evgeny Bareev's guidance in this course, we can be champions in the near future.

Lectures by GM Bareev will concentrate on middlegame and endgame positional concepts such as piece exchange, controlling open files, playing against the two Bishops, the principle of two weaknesses, positional evaluation, Bishop vs. Knight, doubled pawns and attacking the uncastled King. This course is available by invitation only — invitations will be extended to current Team BC members and the highest rated player in each grade.

36-HOUR CHESS TEACHER TRAINING INTENSIVE LEVEL 1



VCS is proud to announce the opening of our first Chess Teacher training course. The purpose of this training course is to provide future chess instructors a fundamental skillset on which they can accumulate skills, and equip them with the essential knowledge needed to be a chess instructor at the basic level. It is not expected that students will have a strong knowledge of chess upon entrance to the program; in fact, it is not a requirement to know how to play chess. All the basic rules and strategies will be covered in the course, as well as methods of chess instruction and tournament organization strategies.

Chess has been shown to improve mental capacity, spatial reasoning, memory and concentration. This course has been designed to instill these qualities in its students, and instruct future coaches on how to instill these qualities in their students. We hope that students will find this course interesting, practical, and rewarding.

VCS MEMBERSHIP PROGRAM



VCS MEMBERSHIP AND CHESS MENTOR EXERCISES

As part of our mission to help our students progress faster and become stronger chess players, we are constantly working on improving and extending our software system and chess content to make chess practice available outside of the VCS classroom. Beginning in the fall of 2017, all VCS parents will be offered to obtain a VCS membership allowing students to access an additional set of personalized chess tools. Two featured new tools are the Chess Mentor Exercises (CME) and the Tactics Trainer.

CME is a very valuable tool that provides personalized additional practice to students. Containing opening repertoire, endgame training, tactics and more, a record tracker and final test score are also recorded and provided to the student to allow them to monitor their own progress. As a tool crafted individually for each student, with exercises chosen to be geared towards each students' weaknesses, CME is an invaluable opportunity for all

students to have access to additional practice.

In addition to the valuable CME tool, students will also have access to a Tactics trainer that consists of two types of exercises: checkmate in one, two, three or four moves, and anti-blunder exercises. The latter is particularly important especially at junior levels where a chess game is typically decided not by the good moves but by the bad moves. This training aims to help students eliminate blunders from their games, which will raise their overall tournament performance significantly. These checkmate and anti-blunder exercises sharpen students' tactical vision and accelerates improvement.

Chess Mentor Exercises and Tactics Trainer are free of charge for all VCS students till September 2017. To have access to CME simply click request Chess Mentor Exercises button on your parent account. Tactics trainer is available on student account under the tab labeled 'Tests'.

INTERIM TEST

RECOMMENDED MINIMUM RATING TO ADVANCE TO THE NEXT LEVEL & INTERIM TEST

As VCS follows the school calendar and will be closed from Dec 17th – Jan 2nd, we have created an OPTIONAL interim test for students to complete over the break if they choose to do so. Covering all the material they learned this past semester this test helps both the student and the coach gauge how much of the material the student is grasping. This test can be found on the student account, under Test -> Chess Mentor Exercises. The students can start, pause and continue the test over the course of the break, and also have the choice to reset the test if they wish to improve upon their score. Each question can be attempted 1-2 times. With a score of 75% or higher on this test the student will be awarded a diamond on their Wall of Fame. It is not mandatory to complete this test, and the completion of this test does not count for or against the student in any way. It is simply extra practice for those who are interested, and a good way to judge their own improvement.

VCS SOFTWARE UPDATES

To allow students to improve their homework scores and increase their practice opportunities and exposure to chess problems, a homework reset feature has been introduced. If not satisfied with their performance, students can reset the homework to 0% and attempt it unlimited additional times. Students are strongly encouraged to take advantage of this feature as it will help increase their homework scores and improve their tactical skills due to the increased practice and time spent on the homework. This feature can be found on students account under Lessons -> Reset link.

Students will also have access to a new feature called Tactics trainer that consists of two types of exercises: checkmate in one, two, three or four moves, and anti-blunder exercises. The latter is particularly important especially at junior levels where a chess game is typically decided not by the good moves but

The popular Play vs. Computer online feature is now also available for CIS students as well,

allowing students to have the opportunity to practice complete games at any time from their home. Students log onto their VCS accounts, select the Play vs. Computer tab, select an opponent based on the rating level they wish to play against, as well as their color and time control. Games are automatically recorded so that students are able to go back after a game and analyze their play.

AUGUST 27TH

The August edition of the monthly VCS active was down slightly in numbers, with thirty-six overall. Continuing the trend from the July event, many of the participants registered at the last minute; the Open Section doubled in size in the last couple of days. A number of the usual suspects were missing, but Tanraj Sohal returned with a new look to demonstrate that a 300-point rating cushion is sometimes meaningful: he won his first five games and took a quick last-round draw with Andrew Hemstapat to claim the first prize. Close behind in second place was Alex Sabaratnam with 5.0 points, who only lost to Sohal. The U1800 prizes were split four

ways between Gilberto Igharas, James Li, Shahrouz Khoraman, and Jonathan Steif.

The Junior Section was consistent with twenty-two entries, one less than last month. The three class trophies went to Raymond Zhang (U600), Eugene Liang (U1000), and Brian Yang (1300); notably Eugene finished first overall with 5.0/5, while Brian lost to Eugene and finished second. Medals were awarded to Eric Jiang, Alex Yu, Borna Amjadi, Sophia Yu, Binary Xiao, Andrew Sabaratnam, Kirill Zubo, and Codrin Pompas. Watch for the next tournament coming up at Columbia College in two weeks (September 17).



SEPTEMBER 17TH

The September edition of the VCS monthly active at Columbia College attracted thirty-one players in two sections. Grigorii Morozov and Davaa-Ochir Nyamdorj were the only two players rated over 2000 and unsurprisingly took the first two places, Grigorii with a perfect 6.0/6 and Davaa only losing to Grigorii. Ulvi Ibrahimov beat Davaa's sister Uranchimeg in claiming the first U1700 prize, while two Mongolian newcomers, father Sanjjav Purevjav and son Bilguun tied for the second U1700 prize with Ryan Yang — they all scored 3.0 points.

In the Junior Section there was a four-way tie for first; it looked like Andrew Xu was going to walk away with the tournament but he lost in the last round to Yawen Zheng, setting up the tie. Andrew won the U1300 Trophy, Yawen the U1000, and Raymond Yao and Alex Yu were awarded medals. The U600 Trophy went to newcomer Aaron Vickers, and Eric Jiang, Gurbaz Singh, and Borna Amjadi also won medals. Watch for the next event on October 15.




OCTOBER 15TH


The October edition of the VCS active saw a larger turnout than in September but again there were only two players rated over 2000. This time around it was Davaa-Ochir Nyamdorj and Mayo Fuentebella who outclassed the rest of the field by two hundred points. Their round five encounter decided first place — Davaa won, while Mayo had to be content with the second prize. Coming in third was Jaylord Talosig, who last played in one of these events in July 2014. Tying for the U1700 prizes were Gilberto Igharas and Jonathan Steif, while Jeff Chen was first U1400 and Ryan Yang second.

In the Junior Section Andrew Xu continued his impressive play of late by taking first overall and the U1300 trophy; the U1000 trophy went to Gillian Mok and Daniel Zhenghao Pan was the best U600. Medals were awarded to Eric Jiang, Alex Yu, Luka Spasojevic, Enoch Liang, and Raymond Zhang. A total of thirty-seven players participated, nine of whom registered at the very last minute or showed up at the door. The next active is on November 5th – a reminder to all potential players that registering early is a big help to the organizers and tournament director. Strictly speaking there is no onsite registration, players are expected to preregister online. Please follow the instructions on the website, or contact us if you experience difficulties.









NOVEMBER 5TH

The November VCS active attracted a total of thirty-three players; the Open had twenty-three, one more than in October, but for whatever reason the Junior Section had an unusually low turnout of only ten players. In the Open Section there were three players over 2000, with Edward Tang trying this format for the first time. For the second event in a row Andrew Hemstapat defeated Davaa-Ochir Nyamdorj to claim sole first place (they tied for first at the Vancouver West Open #11); Davaa won his remaining games and was clear second. Lucian Wu continued his excellent results of late by taking the first U1800 prize, despite being rated only 1460. There was a four-way tie for the second U1800 prize between George Kim, Maven Zheng, Jonathan Steif, and Boya Yang, while Nathan Wu and Ryan Yang split the U1400 prize.

In the Junior Section top-ranked Andrew Xu had an off-day, and it was Eric Jiang who won the U1300 trophy. The other trophies went to Joseph Yan (U1000) and Benjamin Wu (U600), while Samuel Taplin and Borna Amjadi were awarded medals.


VANCOUVER WEST OPEN TOURNAMENTS

The eleventh edition of the Vancouver West Open had the usual tripartite format: a two-day open section, a two-day junior section, and a one-day junior section. The first two were both CFC-regular and CMA rated, the latter only CMA rated. Twenty players registered for the Open Section but most of the highly-rated usual suspects were missing, Davaa-Ochir Nyamdorj being the only player rated over 2000. However, Davaa did not have everything his own way – in round five he lost to rising junior Andrew Hemstapat, who also had a good result at the recent Langley Open. This resulted in Davaa and Andrew tying for first with 5.0/6; as a consequence Andrew pushed his rating over 2000 for the first time.





Ulvi Ibrahimov won the first U1700 prize, Jonathan Steif the second (although he's actually rated under 1300), and Jerry Wang won the U1300 prize.

In the Junior 2-day Andrew Xu dominated, taking the U1300 trophy with a score of 5.5/6, a point and a half ahead of the field. Ryan Yang won the U1500 trophy, Gillian Mok the U1000, and medals were awarded to Henry Yang, Ethan Song, Brian Yang, Bill Wang, and Veronica Guo. And in the Junior 1-day trophies went to Raymond Zhang (U800), Aaron Vickers (U600), and Edward Jeong (U400), and medals to Codrin Pompas, Jermey Liang, Kirill Zubo, and Kiran Sun.



BC JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS 2016

The prestigious annual BC Junior Championship took place at Lansdowne Mall on Nov 11-13. Hosted by the Chess2Inspire organization, this tournament featured the strongest players under 20 in the province. With a minimum rating cutoff for the three-day championship section event, the tournament also featured a Reserve Section for lower rated players and a 1-day Booster Section event for beginners.

With difficult competition including four players rated over 2000 and a three-time past BC Junior Champion, VCS students showed their skills and fared very well. Of notable mention are Brandon Zhu with an outstanding tie for 1st place overall finish, Leo Chung achieving a tie for 2nd place in the Reserve section, Borna Amjadi with a 2nd place finish in the Booster Section and Gillian Mok with a 1st place finish out of the girls in the Booster Section.
