OUR TEAM

CRISTIAN CODIRLASU

One of the Vancouver Chess School's long-time coaches, Cristian is currently teaching classes at the Coquitlam and Richmond locations. Having learned the rules of chess at the age of four, Cristian began taking chess seriously at the age of 15, when he began attending a local club to sharpen his skills. By the age of 23, he had obtained his National Master title.


When asked about what made him consider teaching chess, he refers to his obtaining his master title, at which point he joined a Chess Instructor program and felt that "teaching was a new challenge worth exploring." He points towards inspiration being a focus for him as an instructor, as there are occasionally some students less enthusiastic than others. Consequently, he tries to "talk to each of [his] students individually, to discover what motivates them the most. Overall, Cristian finds teaching a fulfilling experience, saying:

"Teaching allows students and teacher alike to explore the infinite possibilities of chess. It is a shared journey full of excitements and thrills."

From his lengthy experiences as a chess instructor and as a chess player, Cristian states the fastest and most effective way to improve is through 'getting involved in the world of chess'. Apart from just attending the VCS class, other efforts are necessary to achieve high results in chess. Specifically: "Playing and analyzing games as well as solving chess puzzles are probably the most efficient ways to grow as a chess player. The more time you put into it, the more achievements are there for you."

Finally, Cristian speaks to the more philosophical side of the game of chess. He compares chess to a universal language or an ambassador, as "there are always people willing to play a chess game, wherever you travel." He points to connection, competition, and fair play as key learnings of chess, and hopes to see VCS and BC Junior Chess as a whole continuing to instill these qualities in participating young players.

STUDENT OF THE MONTH



NICHOLAS WU

Nicholas was exposed to chess at a very young age. As a toddler, he would often snatch chess pieces from the board when his older brother was playing a game with his father. When they tried to shoo him away, he would often throw a tantrum and refuse to give the pieces back! After this had occurred several times, his father decided that it would be easier to just teach him how to play so that he would not feel left out.

Nicholas started out by learning how the pawns moved, and was soon able to play a game with only pawns on the board. This gave him a lot of pleasure, as he was now able to play a "Pawns" game with his older brother and father. This also gave his father a lot of pleasure, as he could spend quality time with his sons after work. It took a few months for Nicholas to master how pawns move before he moved on to learn the next piece: the king. "Kings and Pawns" then became the new popular game played in the household for the next few months. This process continued until eventually, one-by-one, all the pieces were added onto the board. Nicholas was now ready to play a full game of chess.

When his older brother enrolled at Vancouver Chess School last September, Nicholas naturally wanted to join too. It did not take long before chess class became something he looked forward to each week. Thanks to the instruction of his teacher Cristian Codirlasu and the online features on the VCS website, Nicholas became motivated to learn and eager to improve. One online feature that serves as a great motivational tool for him is the "Wall of Fame". He loves to earn 'diamonds' for his wall, so he always completes his homework and tries to do his best every class. He often reminds his dad to sign him up for the next "Quads" so he can have the opportunity to get a green diamond. So far, Nicholas has earned diamonds of every colour except magenta. He hopes to add this to his collection in the near future.

Our daughter Gillian was first introduced to chess in August 2014 when she was six years old. Because she was already an avid reader and was showing interest in mathematical concepts, we enrolled her in a Math and Chess summer camp. As she was keen to continue, we let her join the classes at Vancouver Chess School the following year. Initially, Gillian was thrilled with victories but was quite saddened by defeats. Over time, we are pleased to see her placing greater focus on developing her own skills and learning from her mistakes. We strongly feel that chess has a very positive influence on our family and would like to share some of our experiences.

Although Gillian loves soccer and enjoys the cello, her passion lies in chess. As with all endeavors of significance, to excel at chess requires hard work. Having passion for the subject has helped Gillian persevere. It gives her the discipline to do her chess homework regularly and looks for ways to improve. As a result, her ratings have improved steadily. We feel that having the experience of getting results through effort at a young age will help Gillian academically.

In her academic career, Gillian will write many exams and give many presentations. They will undoubtedly be stressful. Attending chess competitions has given Gillian valuable experience in dealing with stress. We hope she will eventually learn to harness the adrenalin rush to her advantage. Tournaments also teach Gillian about resilience. Winning or losing one game must not affect her performance in the next one. Attending the Canadian Youth Chess Championship last year in Windsor, Ontario provided Gillian with quality family time with her Dad. It also gave Gillian a taste of what business travel is like; hard work during the day, a nice dinner and brief relaxing time in the evening. After the tournament, we drove through a severe thunderstorm on the way to Niagara Falls. It was a spectacle the neither of us will forget.

Playing chess has taught Gillian to be more careful in her school work. Just as she has learned to double check before making a move to avoid blunders, she is checking her work before handing it to the teachers. We are pleased that her teachers are reporting good improvements.

All in all, playing chess has been a wonderful experience for us. It has been fun and challenging. Gillian has met many new friends at Vanchess and at tournaments. We are very grateful for the dedicated teachers and excellent support materials at Vanchess. We hope Gillian will continue to enjoy playing for a long time.

BENJAMIN COOKNAGY



With 20 participating schools, CIS allows our chess school to have a much broader reach, and enables students throughout the region to have access to our comprehensive chess program. Open to everyone, CIS is able to teach groups of students with varying levels using our unique software and by assigning different class material and homework according to student's level of chess ability. The CIS program consists of the same format as our usual VCS classes, with the coach presenting the class material and students playing against each other as well. Using custom software VCS is able to cater each lesson to the student's needs and the online homework provides extensive practice and exposure to key concepts for optimal improvement.



DECEMBER 17TH WINTER OPEN (3 TOURNAMENTS)

December 17 was the date for the Active Grand Prix, the year-end showdown between the twelve winners of the monthly active events (or their replacements). In addition, a parallel winter open was held for those who didn't qualify for the Grand Prix, topped off by a blitz championship following both events. With an average rating of just over 2200 and a (theoretical) winner-take-all first prize of \$500 the Active Grand Prix was very competitive. After the scheduled five rounds three players were tied for first on 3.5/5: Tanraj Sohal, Alfred Pechisker, and Davaa-Ochir Nyamdorj. With time running out we went to blitz playoffs. Tanraj had the best tiebreak, so Alfred and Davaa played off for the second place; Alfred won, leaving Tanraj and Alfred to play for the first prize. Their game ended in a draw, and with no more time they were declared joint winners.



DECEMBER 17TH WINTER OPEN (3 TOURNAMENTS)

In the conjunct Winter Open top-ranked Paul Burke and junior Dylan Fox split first and second with 4.5/5, with coleader Gilberto Igharas losing to Dylan in the last round. Kevin Butchart and Henry Yang tied for the U1400 prizes, Robert Russell took the top U1200, and there was a five(!)-way tie for the second U1200 prize between Borna Amjadi, Ethan Song, Stephanie Gu, Willaim Zhang, and Eugene Liang. In the Junior Section Kate Jiang was the overall winner; trophies went to Kate, David Zhou, Evan Friesen, and Adrian Kan (U800, U1000, U600, and U400 respectively), while Alex Zou, Bruce Chen, James Hu, Jeremy Jiang, and Roy Zhou received medals.

Last up was the Blitz Championship, a seven-round Swiss with a time control of 3 + 2. Here Grigoriy Morozov reigned supreme, crushing the field with a perfect score. Tied for second with 5.5 points were Brian McLaren and Jeremy Hui. Top U2000 was Brandon Zhu, while there was another five-way tie for the second U2000 prize, this time between Evgeny Tuev, Chuyang Gu, Callum Lehingrat, Charles Wu, and Dylan Fox. The U1500 prizes went to Henry Yang, Ryan Yang, and Stephanie Gu. In the Junior Section Roy Zhou, Fangxun Wang, Adrian Kan, and Bruce Chen were awarded medals. Congratulations to all the winners and thanks to everyone for attending.






JANUARY 7TH ACTIVE

The first VCS active of the new year was smaller than usual but included some newcomers to the event, including Leandro Romero (Argentina) and Kris Gibson (whose last tournament was over six years ago). As in the previous few events there were three players rated over 2000, but despite being the highest rated Romero found the going tough, losing to both Madiyar Amerkeshev and Davaa-Ochir Nyamdorj. Madiyar beat Davaa in round four and appeared to be headed for a perfect score but was brought back to earth in the last round by Kris, leaving Madiyar and Davaa tied for first with 5.0 points each. Gibson and Maven Zheng tied for third; one of the games Gibson lost was in a position where he was pressing with rook and pawn versus rook against Zheng but forgot about his clock and lost on time. Sherry Tian and Adel Talyspayeva won the U1700 prizes.

In the Junior Section trophies went to Benjamin Wu (the overall winner), Ethan Song, and William Jiang, while medals were awarded to Borna Amjadi, Gillian Mok, and Alex Zou.





JANUARY 21ST 2017 BC ACTIVE CHAMPIONSHIP



This year's BC Active Championship was hosted by the Vancouver Chess School at Columbia College (Main and Terminal in Vancouver). Despite the familiar central surroundings the turnout was comparatively low with only twenty-four players, barely larger than a regular monthly active. Perhaps the two-day format was unpalatable for some, or maybe others had had enough chess the previous weekend at the Victoria Open. There were three players rated over 2000 (this has also become standard in the VCS actives of late) and unsurprisingly they took the top three spots. First was Tanraj Sohal with a dominant performance, winning all his games for a perfect score. He was followed at a respectively distance by Davaa-Ochir Nyamdorj and Andrew Hemstapat, who split second and third. Davaa lost to Andrew for the third time in recent events, while Andrew's other loss (they were both beaten by Tanraj) was on time while contemplating a pawn-up rook ending.

The other prizes resulted in multiple ties. Lucian Wu, Adel Talyspayeva, Purevjav Sanjjav, Kamal Singh, Nathan Wu, and Henry Yang split the U1700 prizes, and Andrew Xu, Ethan Song, and Borna Amjadi did the same with the U1350 awards.

JANUARY 15TH REGIONAL QUALIFIER #1

On January 15th, VCS hosted the first of three annual Regional Qualifiers. Taking place at Columbia College in Vancouver, an impressive 71 players turned out to compete for the chance to play at the Provincial Championships later in the season. With a necessary 2.5 points to qualify to this year's prestigious Provincial Championship, the competition was stiff and the play was of a high calibre. After five rounds of play 13 players emerged victorious. Congratulations to all the winners and participants!





FEBRUARY 11TH REGIONAL QUALIFIER #2

The second of the three qualifiers took place on the Family day long weekend at the Executive Airport Plaza Hotel in Richmond. Occurring alongside the prestigious BC Open tournament, junior competitors in the Regional Qualifier had the chance to observe the workings of a larger adult tournament as well. After another long day consisting of 5 rounds of stiff competition, another 13 players came out on top of their respective grades. Congratulations to all those who qualified to the Provincial championships, as well as all the participants who came out for the day!

MARTH 5TH REGIONAL QUALIFIER #3

The third and final Provincial Qualifier took place once again at Columbia College in Vancouver. With an astonishing 121 players, this event was by far the largest of its type in recent VCS history. All participants, eager for the last chance to secure their spot at this year's Provincial Championship, brought their best chess for a fierce five rounds of play on March 5th. Once again, 13 players were crowned champions of their grades and many more gained a spot in the provincial competition. A warm congratulation to all winners, qualifiers and participants of this year's Regional Qualifier series!



APRIL 2nd BC PROVINCIAL CHAMPIONSHIP

After much excitation, April 2 brought the much-anticipated finale of the 2017 Chess Challenge season: the BC Chess Challenge Provincial Championship. All players who had qualified through the three regional qualifiers as well as previous champions that had already been pre-qualified turned up at Columbia College to battle it out for the title of BC Champion in their grade. Besides the honour of being the 2017 BC Champion, at stake was also the opportunity to be a part of Team BC 2017 and represent BC at the annual Canadian Chess Championships. After tough games and grueling playoffs, 13 new provincial champions were crowned.



VCS SOFTWARE UPDATE

VCS is excited to announce a new feature available to its users – Tutorials. These video tutorials range from technical support to basic chess instruction, and are intended to assist parents in using our custom system. Topics covered include course registration, system overviews, tax receipts and more. We strongly encourage all parents to view these videos to become more familiar with the VCS system and all it has to offer.





Another new feature open to all VCS users is the Play vs. Computer Delay. A major hurdle for many players, particularly younger players and those players just beginning, is to slow down and spend more time on each move. This delay can be set by the players' parents to be, for example, 10 seconds. When the player goes to use the 'Play vs. Computer' feature on their accounts, they will then not be able to move until the prescribed amount of time has elapsed, thus forcing them to spend time considering each move. Slowing down will eliminate blunders, the main cause for losing games at introductory levels, and therefore it is strongly urged you employ this feature to help improve your student's performance. See the 'Delay' Tutorial for detailed instructions on how to set this delay feature.

VCS YEAR-END PICNIC PARTY JUNE 11TH


